Topic: Bears

Tapestry-

Phonics -

The children have started learning phonics using the Read Write Inc programme (RWInc). They have been learning how to pronounce the sounds clearly using pure sounds ('m' not 'muh') The link below demonstrates the correct pronunciation.

This week they have learnt these sounds; c, k, u, b.

They have learnt how to orally blend sounds to say words (Fred Talk). The link below explains how to do 'Fred Talk' https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=dEzfpod5w_Q

Have a go at using 'Fred Talk' to sound out and blend these words; car, van, train.

We are sending home a phonic game in the children's book bags with their reading books. The game does not need to be returned to school. Have a go at using the sound cards to make words.

Fred Talk routine

- 1. Say the word in sounds as Fred e.g. c-a-t.
- 2. Ask your child to repeat. Can they 'jump-in' with the whole word?
- 3. Say the word in sounds followed by the whole word e.g. c-a-t, cat
- 4. Ask your child to repeat



Literacy -

We are continuing to look at the Bear story 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt'. We are learning to retell the story and create our own tactile story map.

Reading -

We are sending your child home with a wordless reading book.

Wordless picture books are told entirely through their illustrations — they are books without words, or sometimes just a few words. Sharing wordless books is a terrific way to build important literacy skills, including listening skills, vocabulary, and comprehension.

<u>Sharing a Book</u>


- Spend time looking at the cover and talking about the book's title. Based on those two things, make a few predictions about the story.
- Take a "picture walk" through the pages of the book. Enjoy the illustrations, which are often rich with detail. Look carefully at the expressions on characters' faces, the setting and the use of colour. Talk to each other about what you see. These conversations will enrich the storytelling.
- Enjoy the pictures and point out a few things, but don't worry too much about telling a story yet. Just enjoy the pictures and get a sense of what the book is about.
- Go back through the book a second time and get ready for some great storytelling! Consider going first and acting as a model for your child. Have characters use different voices, add sound effects and use interesting words in your version of the book.

Maths -

Have a go at this activity. Please make an observation for your child's Tapestry account.



Gather some natural objects from your autumn walk. Chose two different objects and make a repeating pattern with them.





See how many different patterns you can make.
